Have You Checked Your Credits?

Fellow students, do you check the credits you earn each year? Many times students do not keep track of their credits and when graduation time is here begin to wonder if they have what they need to graduate.

Now that the end of the year is here, everyone should make sure that he has all his book reports and required projects completed for each course so he gets his credits. If you do not have everything handed in, you may have to repeat a semester in some course, just because you were careless.

During his four years of high school a student must have: four years of English; one year of American history; one year of American government; one year of some laboratory science, such as general science, chemistry, physics, or biology; one year of algebra; and one year of social science other than American history and American government. Each student must also have 16 credits.

Instead of waiting until the last half of your senior year to see how many credits you have, you should check each year on that year's credits.

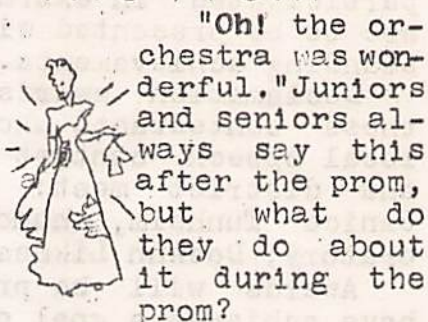
Besides her work in journalism, Carol has taken part in the junior class play, "The Magic Touch," and the senior class play, "Hillbilly Weddin'".

SHIRLEY SWENSEN, who is still single and works as head secretary in the Hime-stake Gold Mine drove to Langford in her new gold Cadillac.

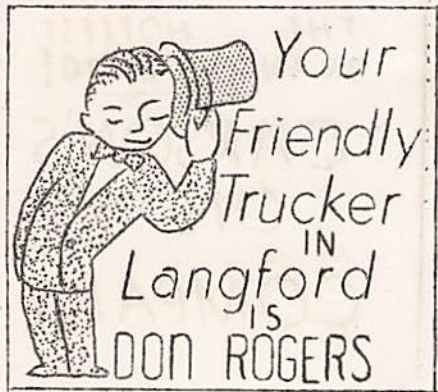
DENNIS HOLLAND, flew in from New York where he is chief art editor of the New York times.

A water fountain, purchased by money earned by the students in a magazine drive thld this year, was installed this week.

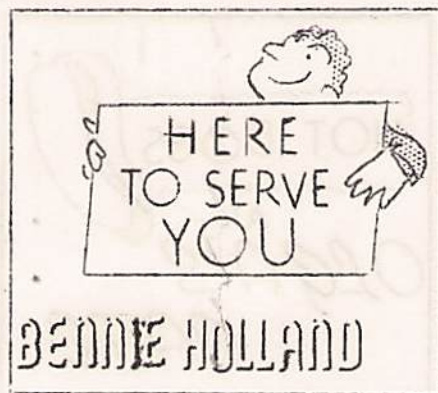


Homemaking Girls Entertain Guests
